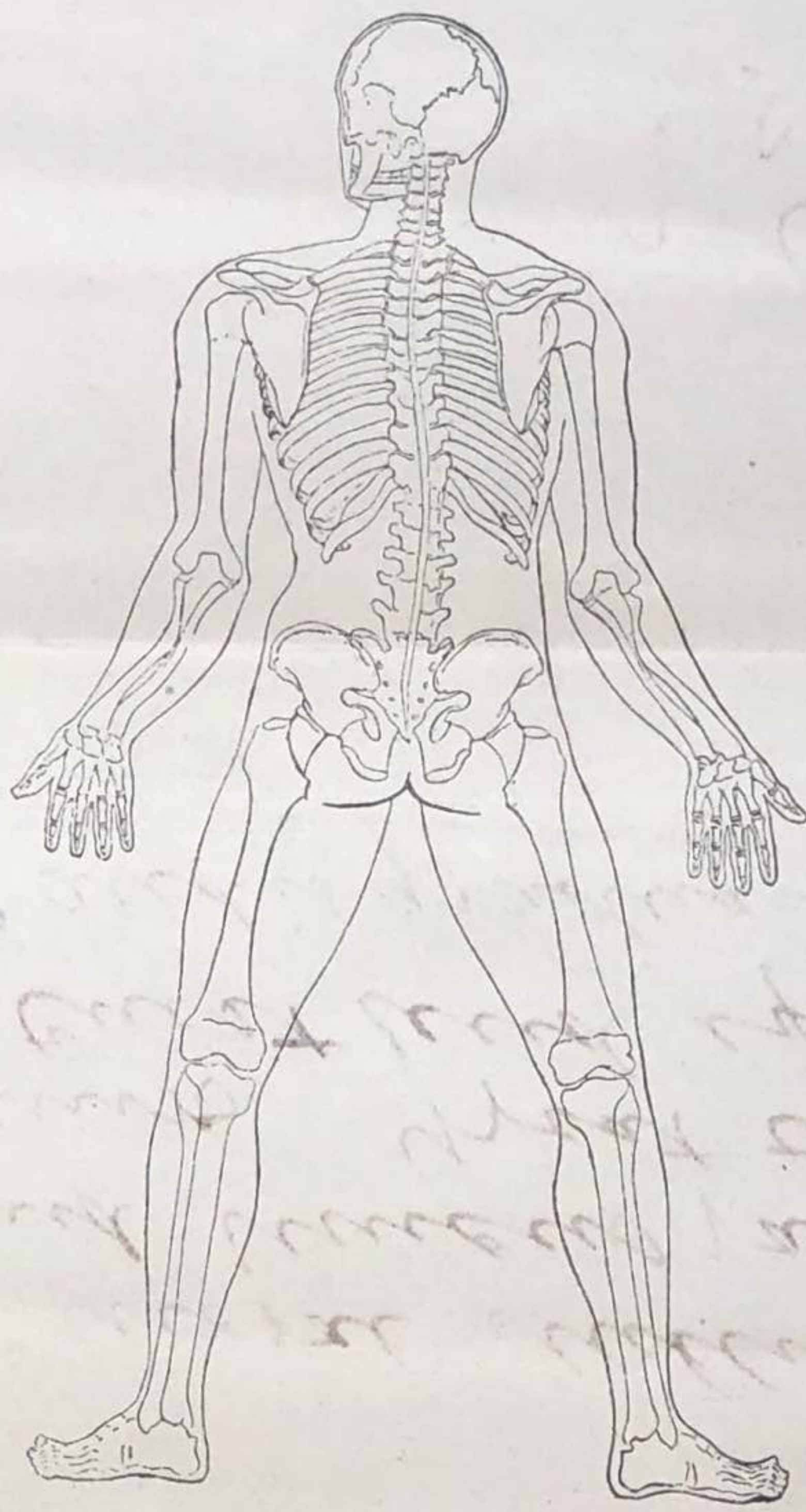
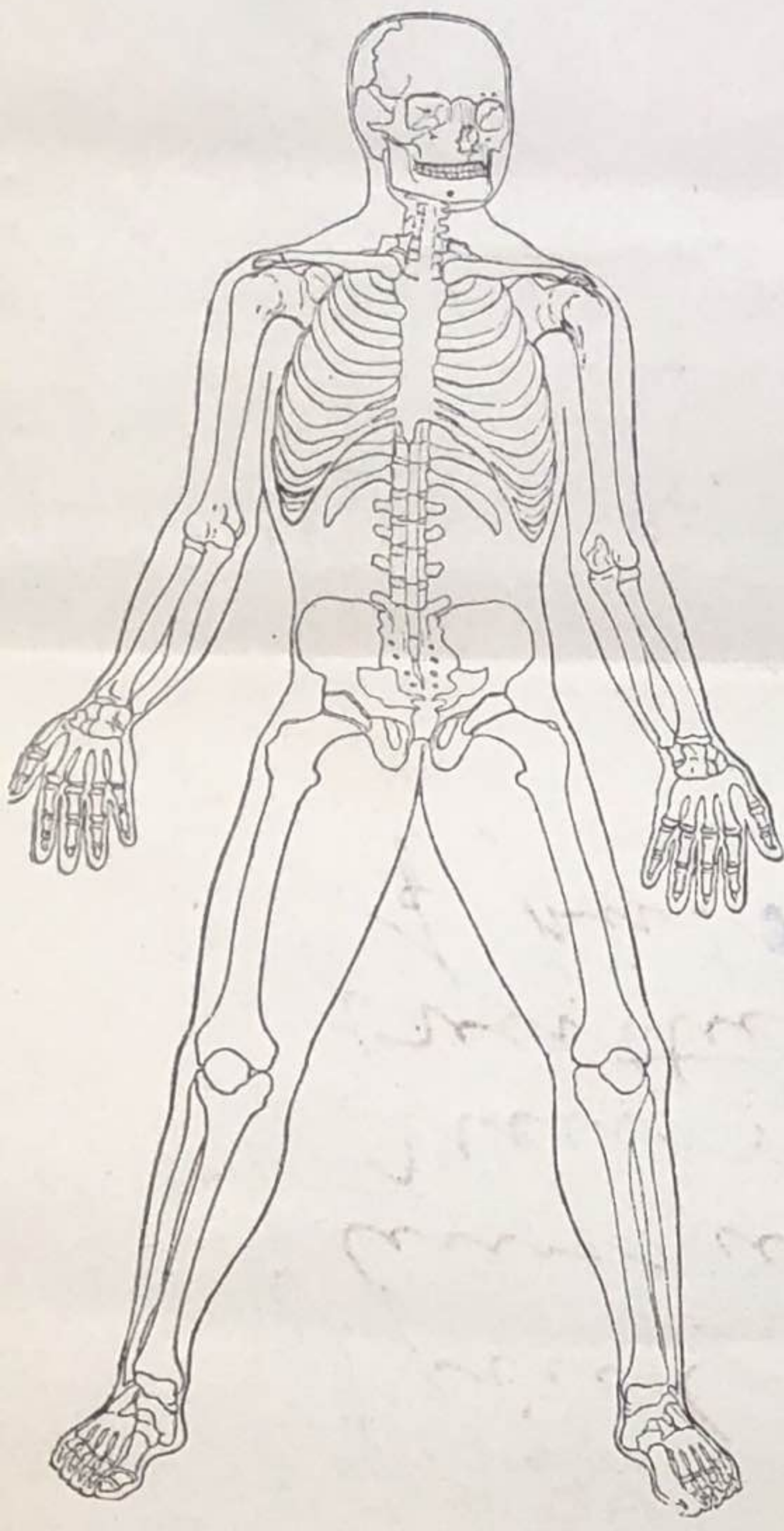
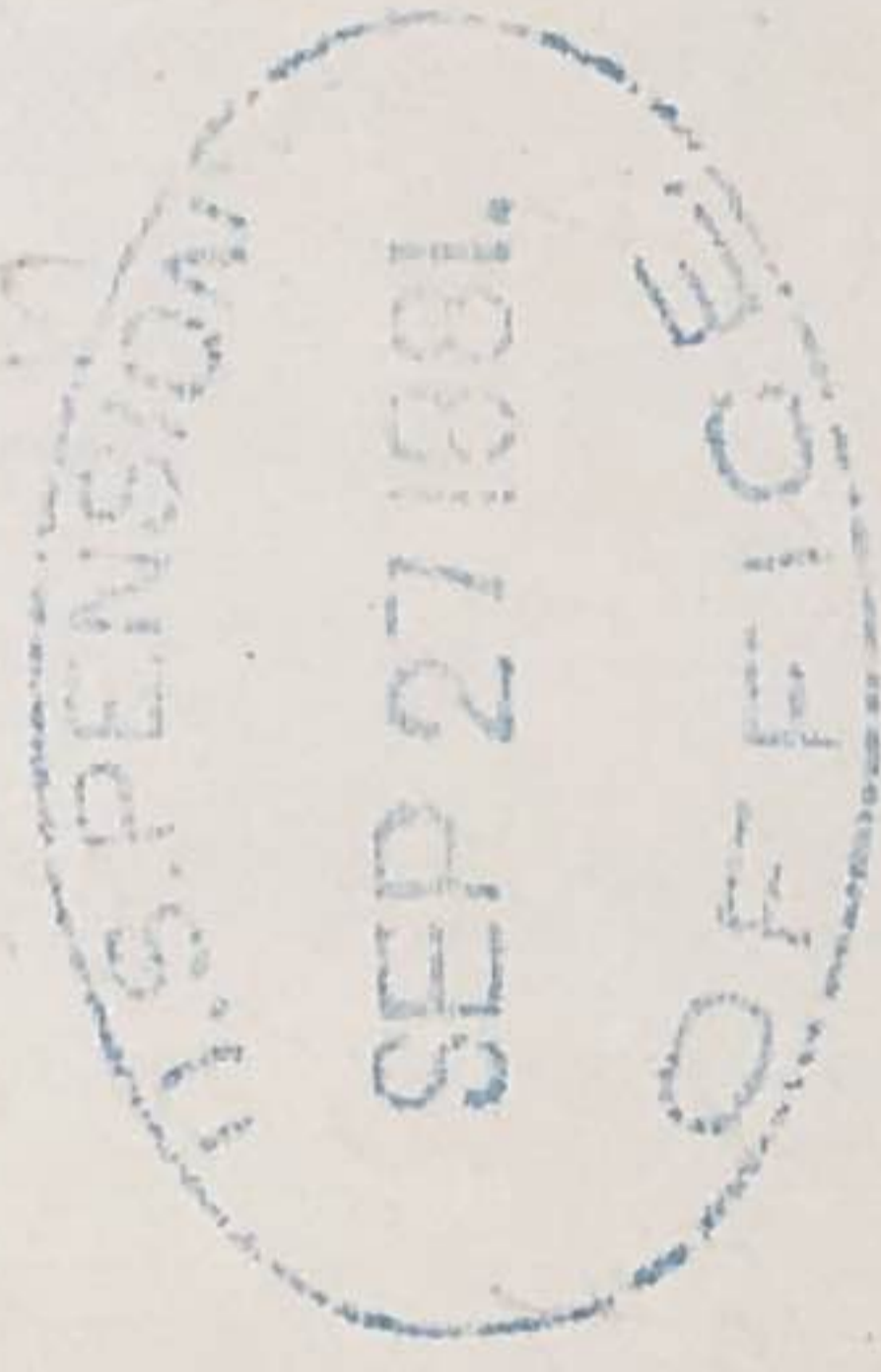

That while a member of the organization aforesaid, in the service and in the line of his duty at Taylor, Texas, in the State of Texas, on or about the 15th day of February, 1864, he contracted a severe cold from

of War, having been captured & taken to said place on the 15th day of February 1864. That such cold settled on his lungs and resulted in Consumption from which he is now suffering to such an extent as to unfit him for doing any labor

That he was treated in hospitals as follows: In Hospital at Taylor Texas, Bull Camp of treatment.

That he has not been employed in the military or naval service otherwise than as stated above that is as a Private in Co "C" 43rd Reg. Ind Vols

That since leaving the service this applicant has resided in the Town of Iperca & Baltimore in the State of Kansas, and his occupation has been that of a Farmer

That prior to his entry into the service above named he was a man of good, sound, physical health, being when enrolled a Farmer That he is now wholly disabled from obtaining his subsistence by manual labor by reason of his injuries, above described, received in the service of the United States; and he therefore makes this declaration for the purpose of being placed on the invalid pension roll of the United States.

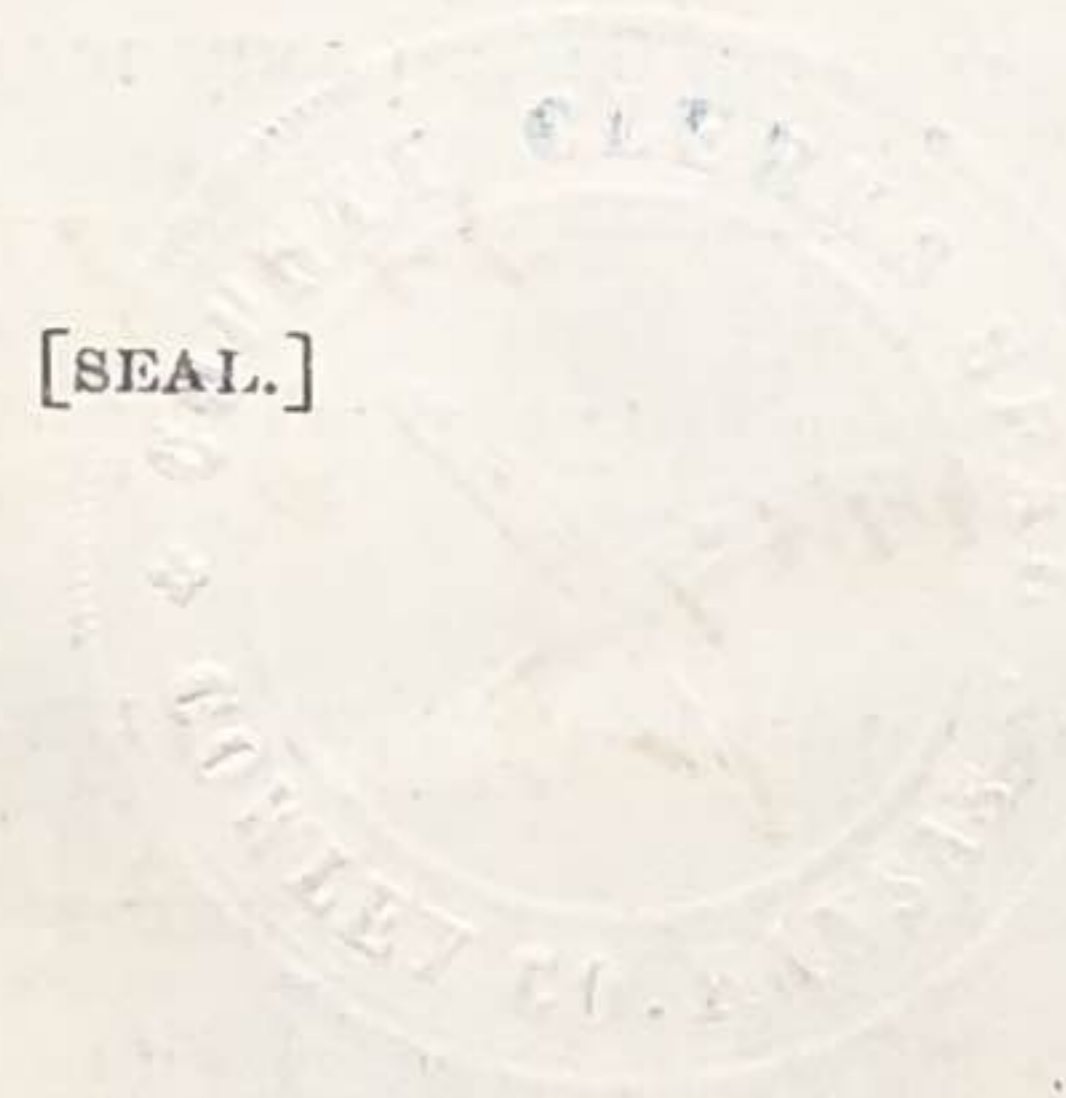

Upon examination we find the following objective conditions: Pulse rate, 106; respiration, 23; temperature, 99; height, 5 feet 8 inches; weight, 138 pounds; age, 53 years. Pulse rate standing 122; After brisk exercise 142

There is increased dullness on percussion in the upper half of the left lung & more extensive dullness in the right. Bronchial breathing & bronchial voice to correspond to the area of dullness.

The actual or probable origin of every existing disability must be fully set forth. Whenever a disability is shown, or is believed to be due to or aggravated by vicious habits the opinion of the board must be stated. When not due to such habits this fact must be stated.

No rales distinguishable yet there is pretty profuse purulent expectoration. This appears to be one of those cases in which the physical signs of disease of the lungs are not so plain & exaggerated as the increased temperature & the cardiac action would indicate.

He has a very aggravated nasal & pharyngeal catarrh & a small polypus in the left nostril. The left ear is slightly deaf cannot hear ~~loud~~ ordinary conversation at 3 feet but can hear loud conversation at 3 feet. Right ear all right.

The stomach appears thickened & very sore. The bowels are not sore. Tongue flobby & fissured. The mouth shows rosy of scurvy & the few remaining

teeth are loose. The rectum is in fairly good condition at this time but he gives a history of piles which trouble him periodically. No hemorrhoidal tumors

Extensive varicose veins on right leg which extend from the middle of the thigh down almost to the ankle - are worst on the inside & back of the leg & are largest just below the knee - they range from 2 to 6 times the natural size. He is poorly nourished & the varicose veins are probably due to the degeneration caused by the scurvy.

Right oblique inguinal hernia; passes through the external ring. external ring about $\frac{3}{4}$ inches

Upon examination we find the following objective conditions: *Chronic Nasal Catarrh both Anterior and Post-nasal with hypertrophy of pyriform bones; Atrophic Pharyngitis and Plastic Bronchitis, the chronic nasal, pharyngeal and bronchial troubles being exceptionally severe. There is occlusion of both Eustachian tubes, perforation of right membrana tympani and the membranes of both ears are anaemic, dry and scaly. The watch cannot be heard beyond 16 in from either ear. - There is a marked varicose condition of the veins of left leg - the Long & Short Saphenous Veins and their branches overflowing the superficial veins of the entire limb. The Short Saphenous vein is fully 1/2 in in diameter, and there is evidence of rupture and a tendency to ulcerate. This is the "Result of Scourvy" as specified in claimant's application. The original attack, as described by claimant, was doubtless* (See 3-100)

From the existing condition and the history of this claimant, as stated by himself, it is, in our judgment, *probable* that the disability was incurred in the service as he claims, and that it has not been prolonged or aggravated by vicious habits. He is, in our opinion, entitled to a *12/78*

Rate for each cause of disability. If prolonged by vicious habits, the word not should be erased and the reason for the erasure given.

This is in response to your letter dated January 25, 1939, requesting certain information relative to the case of your father, the above named veteran.

An examination of the case folder discloses that the veteran, Henry Jackson, was enrolled August 28, 1861, as a Private, Company C, 43rd Regiment, Indiana Volunteer Infantry, in what appears to be Bloomfield, Indiana, and was mustered out at Indianapolis, Indiana, March 17, 1865. The files do not contain any information relative to the names of his parents. His age at the date of enrollment is not stated but the veteran, in his application for pension executed January 21, 1880, stated that he was then thirty-five years of age.

It is not believed that the veteran was married prior to his marriage to Elizabeth Kirkpatrick, and the date of his marriage to her has not been definitely established. However, the mother of Elizabeth stated under date of August 19, 1897, that the said Elizabeth died at her house in Topeka, Kansas, in the year 1874, leaving surviving two children, the youngest of whom died about six months following the death of the mother. The names of the children in question have never been stated.

The veteran married Amy A. Sweet August 7, 1879, in Baltimore, Cowley County, Kansas.

The veteran died June 29, 1897, and the cause of his death, as stated by the attending physician, was phthisis pulmonary or pulmonary tuberculosis.

In her application for widow's pension filed July 23, 1897, Amy Jackson stated that the first wife, Elizabeth Kirkpatrick, whom the



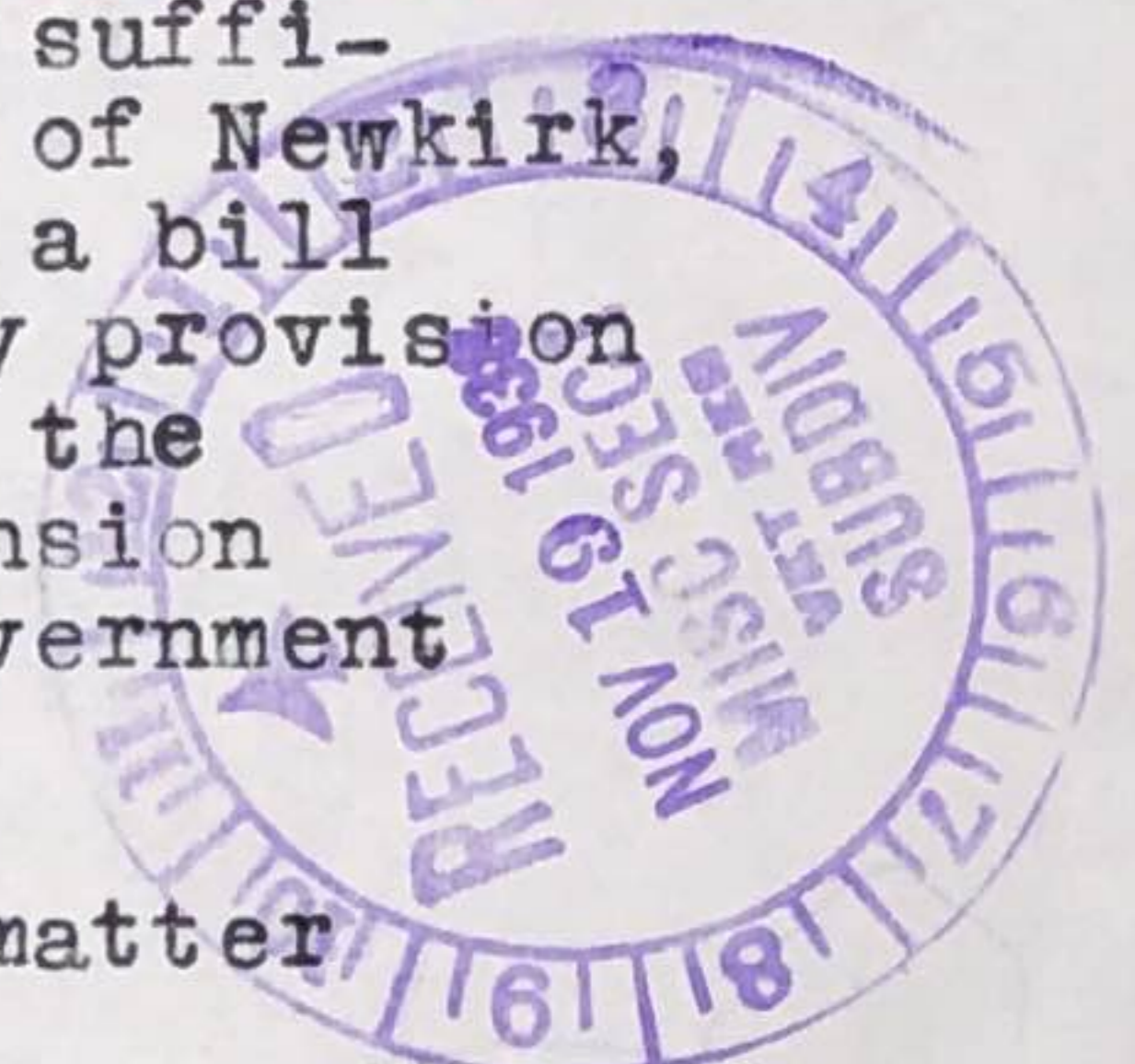

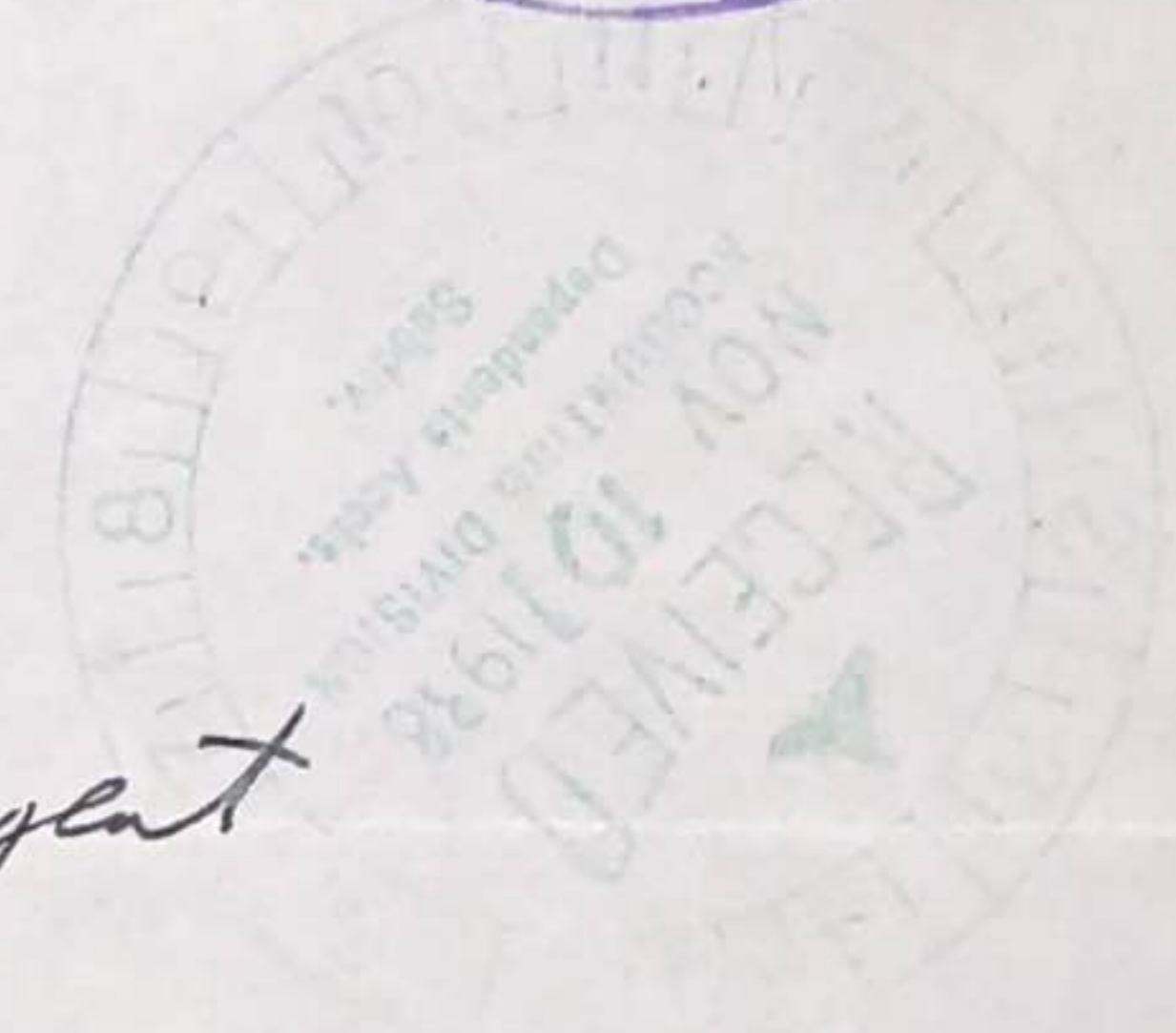

This is in reply to your letter of November 7, 1938.

Government burial allowance does not extend to a member of a veteran's family. This allowance pertains to veterans discharged from service only.

The pension accrued from the date of last payment to the date of death of Mrs. Amy Jackson is not an asset of her estate and is not payable to heirs. It may be paid, under certain conditions, on expenses incurred for her last illness and burial provided she was not survived by a minor child under sixteen and did not leave sufficient assets to pay for this expense. If it is desired to file claim, the enclosed Form 5036 should be executed and returned, attention being invited to the copy of the law and instructions on the back of the form.

A certified copy of the public record of her death bearing the signature and seal of the custodian of the record is required in support of the claim.

The accrued pension is the only amount which may be found payable by the Veterans' Administration on the expense of the last illness and burial of the pensioner.

The agent or attorney of record in the prosecution of the case may cause to be filed with the Commissioner of Pensions duplicate articles of agreement without additional cost to the claimant, setting forth the fee agreed upon by the parties, which agreement shall be executed in the presence of and certified by some officer competent to administer oaths. In all cases where application is made for pension or bounty-land, and no agreement is filed with the Commissioner as herein provided the fee shall be \$10 and no more. And such articles of agreement as may hereafter be filed with the Commissioner of Pensions are not authorized, nor will they be recognized except in claims for original pensions, claims for increase of pension on account of a new disability, in claims for restoration where a pensioner's name has been or may hereafter be dropped from the pension rolls on testimony taken by a special examiner, showing that the disability or cause of death, on account of which the pension was allowed, did not originate in the line of duty, and in cases of dependent relatives whose names have been or may hereafter be dropped from the rolls on like testimony, upon the ground of non-dependence and in such other cases of difficulty and trouble as the Commissioner of Pensions may see fit to recognize them; Provided, That no greater fee than \$10 shall be demanded, received or allowed in any claim for pension or bounty-land granted by special act of congress, nor in any claim for increase of pension on account of the increase of the disability for which the pension had been allowed. And provided, further, That no fee shall be demanded, received, or allowed in any claim for arrears of pension or arrears of increase of pension allowed by any Act of Congress, passed subsequent to the date of the allowance of the original claims in which such arrears of pensions or of increase of pension may be allowed."
